New Fence Protects John Jacob Spainhour Cemetery



Visitors to the John Jacob Spainhour cemetery will now find it protected by a charming stately black ornamental fence which was donated and installed by Fence Builders, Inc.

We would like to thank Jackie, Mark, and Steve Shelton and their employees for their generous donations of time and materials. Jackie is a Spainhour descendant of the Charles and Nancy Aldridge Spainhour line and is the ggggranddaughter of John Jacob Spainhour.

The new fence is made of galvanized steel with a powdered coating giving the appearance of wrought iron. It replaces the original wood rail fence that they had



previously installed years ago.

The new fence is the second project to have focused on the cemetery in recent months. The first project was to remove several unstable trees that had become a threat to the fragile grave markers.

Now, with the trees removed and the new fence in place, our next project at the cemetery will concentrate on cleaning and preserving the grave markers themselves. Decades of weather and mother nature have taken a toll on the face of the stones. Great care must be taken since both John Jacob's and Anna Catherine's markers (see "New Fence for Cemetery" pg. 2)

composed of two brothers and their two sisters, all their spouses and their children. We follow two of this group's children as they migrate southward, eventually settling in North Carolina.

Some scenes of the play depict life as it was at the historic Bethabara Mill where Spainhour, Hauser, Shore, and Strupe families were among many who tarried there in refugee cabins during threats of Indian attacks in 1756 - 1758.

The play also includes the building of the pioneer cabin by Johann Jacob Spainhour and wife Anna Catherine Volck (Fulk) which was later relocated to its current home in King Central Park.

The feature event of the day will be the presentation of the play which will begin at 2:00 in the King Central Park Amphitheatre.

Other activities scheduled include a Bethabara Mill Tour and a catered Luncheon at the picnic pavilion in King Central Park. The reconstructed pioneer cabin and its kitchen will also be open to visitors during the morning hours.

Between 10:00 a.m. and noon, interested parties will be guided on a visit to the Bethabara Mill site and to the Moravian "Stranger's Graveyard" and the old Dobbs Parish Cemetery

which are nearby. Our own guides will show you specifically where the refugee cabins were built. This visit to Bethabara will be very different from the Bethabara tours taken during the Family Reunions in 1995 and 2002. This visit will not include the village itself - but will be limited to the mill site and the nearby cemeteries which have only more recently become available to tour.

Pre-registration for the day will be required for the Bethabara Mill Tour and for the Luncheon.

Our goal is to make full participation in all the day's events as inexpensive as possible. We will be completing detailed preparations for the day on April 8. After this date, additional capacity for the Bethabara Tour and for the Luncheon will become very limited. Additional details about the day and registration forms have been mailed to our Newsletter subscriber list.

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Winston-Salem Journal Recognizes Robert G. Carroll

King Historian Man has become the informal recorder of history for Stokes County By Kim Underwood JOURNAL REPORTER Sunday, February 13, 2005

Robert G. Carroll can tell you how King acquired its name, how early residents outwitted a neighbor trying to profit at King's expense, and how the first car came to town. Carroll, 97, knows many such stories. During the 85 years he lived in Stokes County, he became an informal historian for the county.

He wrote a history of King called One Hundred Years of King History 1888-1988. He also wrote a weekly column for The Danbury Reporter that focused on Stokes County history from 1974 until 2002 when the Reporter and King Times News were consolidated as The Stokes News.

Carroll's interest in county

history is coupled with an interest in genealogy, and, over the years, people have regularly come to him for help in filling in their family's history. "If you ever want to know anybody you're related to, ask him," his daughter, Cecelia Overby, said. "I think he has helped a lot of families discover and preserve their history," said nephew Ron Carroll. Mr. Carroll thinks that his passion for history and genealogy is key to his longevity. "I stay interested," he said. His wife didn't share his love of history and genealogy. She would say, "He's down in his office playing with the dead people."

We see them once or twice a year and on occasion we chat on the telephone.

Merrin has a breathing problem caused by his years of

A Family Treasure

The Civil War Diary of Rufus Spainhour (cont'd) Contributed by his great-grandson Al Spainhour

Nov the 6th (1861)

While at Raleigh on my return, I was taken sick with chills and fever. I went to Wake Forest College and stayed awhile where I was very kindley treated by Mrs. Puryfoy(?) and others. I then went immediately to the Regt. and found the boys improving.

Nov the 13th, 1861

Went to F'burg to day and brought.(?) Settled for the coffin of James.

Nov the 14th

Went to the Regt. and brought down James's things to be sent home. The weather very cold.

Nov the 25th

Up to this time nothing of interest has occurred. Today we received a large gun for our battery weighing 14,700 lbs. a rifle(d) peace. We have been engaged sometime building winter quarters.

December the 18

Have been hard at work on our cabin, and just got in it. I feel unwell tonight.

Dec. the 24th

Have gotten very sick with fever. I have suffered a great deal

for the past few days more from restlessness than any other way. Today I was sent to Fredericksburg, and had the good fortune to get to the house of Rev Broadhurst D. D. and was so kindly treated. I shall ever remember them as fridnds indeed; they were as kind to me as my folks at home could possibly have been. Dr. B S. Herndon attended on me and seemed to do all he could for me. he says I have a kind of slow fever. He is said to be a very skillful physician. L. J. Curtis stayed with me and attended on me with a great deal of kindness which may I ever remember.

Dec the 27th

Untill today there has been no change, but today I feel a little better.

Dec the 31

The close of this year finds me quite unwell but much improved.

1862

Jan the 1st

Today I feel sufficiently improved go back (go back has been struck out) to allow Curtis to go back to camp.

Jan the 2nd

Much improved. I am able to

go down stairs today. This eavning my father came to see me which revived me much.

Jan the 3rd

Father went to the Regt. today to get a furlough for me, but he telegraphed back for me to go down and be examed which I did and got a furlough and we came back to F'burg and the next morning left for home and landed there the 6th.

January the 8th, 1862

Went today to the burial of my old schoolmate D. M. Benfield who was taken sick while in the army in (?) Weston Va. when after suffering much he was removed to Petersburg, where on Christmas eavning his spirit took its flight; his father hearing of his illness hurried a second time to him but too late, his body had been buried several days; but he had his remains taken up and he brought them home and had them buried in his family graveyard.

January the 9

Spent my time at home very pleasantly, visited a great deal and was visited some. Started back to my Regiment today, went to Spaigles(?) at the head of the road.

Discover Bethania

Stroll through village gives glimpse into a vanished time

Most people hurry through Bethania on their way to someplace else. The narrow street through the heart of town doesn't invite casual stopping, so traffic scurries along at a relentless pace, and those with an inclination to sightsee are likely to find themselves hustled past the village in the blink of an eye.



The old school house originally was put up in 1897 for the Knights of Pythias. The millstone was used at the 1784 Bethania Mill.

But for those who circle back, find a spot to park along a side street and take the time to explore the uneven stone sidewalks of Bethania, the flavor and charm of the village are easy to find. Of the three early Moravian villages in Forsyth County, Bethania is the only one that is still a living

community. Bethabara, with only a couple buildings still standing, is a faint echo of a vanished time. Salem is a still-life of a Colonial village, populated by costumed guides who abandon its streets at night to return to their own reallife homes. A few people live in Old Salem, but the streets are quiet in the off-hours.

Bethania is an unorchestrated mix of old and new, hearth and commerce, history and daily life. It was never a purely Moravian community, and its mix of cultures and backgrounds may have saved it from becoming a museum piece.

Most of the houses bear the names of their original owners and such dates as 1775, 1805, 1864, and 1920 are prominently displayed. Some homes are carefully restored to period condition, While others have been modernized with siding, brick or stone and retain only a suggestion of their original appearance.

An unhurried stroll along the shaded paths reveals details of period architecture, relics of stone and rusted ironwork, and such

whimsy as a metal bird perched on a wriggly lamppost, or rustic birdhouses scattered in the limbs of a gnarled cedar tree.



Shapes and textures make this birdhouse stand out against a fieldstone outbuilding.

Nearly all the houses are carefully tended with thoughtful attention to detail, and an eclectic blend of old and less-old reflects a quiet pride of place.

A three-way stop sign arrests traffic at Main Street and Bethania Road long enough for a driver to notice the restorations of the Wolff-Moser House and the Alpha Chapel as a visitor center and town hall, respectively.

When completed, the additions may lure in a few more visitors to discover this unique corner of Forsyth County.

Dorothy Hendrix Spainhour (GREENSBORO, NC)

Spainhour, Jr.

Dorothy Hendrix Spainhour passed away on Monday, January 17, 2005 at Friends Homes in Greensboro, NC after a long illness. She was born July 14, 1922 in Greensboro, the middle daughter of the late William Hendrix and Pearl Cook Hendrix. She was preceded in death by her sisters, Louise Hendrix and Betty DeHaven: and husband, Edwin

Dorothy graduated from Greensboro Senior High School and received a BA in Education from UNC-G in 1943. She worked as a teacher in Thomasville. In 1946, she married Edwin and moved to Favetteville where she helped establish the Fayetteville Center for Handicapped Children. This pioneering school began in a church basement and provided much needed services to Cumberland County. It grew, thrived and was eventually incorporated into the public schools. 1976, "The Dorothy Spainhour School", a new educational facility for the developmentally disabled

in Fayetteville was dedicated in her honor.

Dorothy continued her career as an educator until receiving an MA in Speech Pathology from UNC-G. She then became a Speech Pathologist for the Fayetteville city schools and Chief of the Speech Pathology Section of Womack Army Hospital at Fort Bragg.

You will need a password to enter the database portion of the site. You may receive that by e-mailing the database manager at the link on the site.





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
