


Yadkin Valley Families Who? When? Why? How?

During the presentation of Patsy Ginn's play "Of Faith and Courage" last May, we stressed the many family "inter-connections" which developed during the years of the early settlements in the Yadkin Valley of North Carolina.

Specifically, we focused on a geographical circle about 30 miles in diameter within this valley. That circle includes the present-day villages of Rural Hall, Germanton, Walnut Cove, Bethabara, Bethania, Pfafftown, East Bend, Yadkinville, Pinnacle, Tobaccoville, and King.

Phase One of our project is to collect a brief history for each of our inter-connected families; arrange these in chronological order; and mark the locations inside our circle where that family first settled. This is the first report from the project. It focuses on the years 1753 and 1754. Three Hauser families began their settlement in our circle on October 22, 1753 and the Moravian Brothers arrived to begin their settlement at Bethabara on November 17, 1753.

Maria Barbara Geiger, Maria Margaretha Schaeffer's mother, was from Ruttingen, Switzerland. Soon after her daughter's marriage, she migrated to Pennsylvania with a group of Mennonites. Conditions in Alsace were not improving, and thousands were responding to the Rhineland advertisements of William Penn. Margaretha begged Martin that they too should go, but he was reluctant. Finally she convinced him and in late 1726, they, with their two-year old son. Martin Jr., began the long journey northward, along the Rhine, through Germany and Holland, to Rotterdam.

In Rotterdam, Martin must have worked as a carpenter for

Our online genealogy system has received significant updates to our collections of Shore, Arney, Fiscus, Hilsabeck, and Speas. This project continues with Fiscus, Fulk, and others. The current emphasis is on our family lineages in Indiana and Iowa.

Thanks to the efforts of Virginia Wagner, a new scrapbook has been initiated. This new scrapbook will contain a series of family stories and biographies. The first item introduces Robert L. Patton, Ginny's grandfather. One of our historical interests includes the probable genealogical linkage between Robert Patton and James Patton -- who headed the land company from which Heinrich Spainhour bought his farm in New River, Virginia.

Killing James Patton, Colonel of the local Militia, was the key objective for the Shawnee Indians who attacked the settlements in the New River Valley in 1755. The Shawnees burned Heinrich Spainhour's home and farm buildings during their first attack in early July, but failed to find James Patton during that raid. Later that same month, however, they attacked again and killed Patton plus many others. This second attack was named the Draper Meadows Massacre, about which much as been written. The massacre and its aftermath was also the subject of a Hollywood movie.

We hope to learn more about those two years (1753-1755) in the lives of Heinrich Spainhour, Frederick & Heinrich Shore, and the Strupe brothers who were also living nearby, and who also sought refuge, first at the Townfork Settlement in North Carolina, then later joined together at the Bethabara Mill, and then at Bethania.

more than six months because they did not leave that city until the summer of 1727. Sailing aboard the English ship "Molly", commanded by Captain John Hodgeson, the small family crossed the North Sea, touched land again at Deal, in East Kent, England, and then began the hazardous voyage across the Atlantic. The ship was crowded, the food dry, wormy, and minimal.

Eventually, most of the

passengers were stricken with fever and some were lost. Among the dead was young Martin, Jr., but his mother, herself feverish and too delirious to distinguish dreams from reality, was unaware for days. Sadly, Martin Sr. was alone when his son was buried at sea. What regret he must have felt for ever leaving home!

On September 30, 1727, the "Molly" anchored at Philadelphia. Her Rhineland passengers, numbering 70 families, swore allegiance to the new English King, George II, himself a German, and scattered north, west, and south. At Conshohockien, to the northwest (of Philadelphia), Martin and Margaretha found her mother, Barbara, living with the Mennonites.

Responding to Barbara's pleas, Martin & Margaretha settled here for over two years. There, on February 8, 1730, was born their first American son, Hans Georg. Margaretha's mother died shortly after this, and Martin, always a Lutheran at heart, was dissatisfied among the Mennonites and desired to move on.

At the Berkiana River, a second son, Michael, was born on September 29, 1731. On October 16, 1733, came the twins, Martin & Jacob, at Shippach (Skippack) Township.

After seven years Martin decided to move again. They crossed the Susquehanna to the Conowago River south of York. Here they remained six years, during which two more sons were born.

Two years later another move was made four miles further south into the colony of Maryland where Martin, now 50 years old, took up farming. Life in Maryland

was adequate but not plentiful. Martin was aging and the best lands there had already been taken up ---- so the two older sons decided to seek their fortunes elsewhere.

The steady stream of pioneers moving through Maryland, bound for the Great Valley of Virginia, had become a familiar sight and in 1751 Hans Georg and Michael started south in search of new land. Their destination was western Carolina, because they had heard rumors of rich soil and sparse population there.

The journey south was long and treacherous -- with plenty of Indians, panthers, bears, etc. One night, while they slept, their horses were stolen, so the rest of their trip was on foot. They reached Carolina sick and without money, but their spirits were raised by what they found along the Yadkin River; rich soil mixed with sand, good wooded hills, good water, and stones on the hills which could be used for building. The land was largely unsettled, but there were German trappers in the area and the brothers worked among them for a year in order to buy new horses. Michael saved enough to acquire some river land from the Granville Land Office.

In October, 1752, the two brothers began their return to Maryland. Arriving home in November, the family all began a year of planning and preparation for the new migration. -- but wives were not to be found on the unsettled frontier -- the brothers must accomplish this goal before leaving Maryland!

Michael married his sweetheart. longtime Anna Fiscus, & Georg married Anna Margartha Elrod, in July 1753, just before they all left Maryland for North Carolina. The three Hauser families arrived in the Yadkin River Valley on October 22, 1753 and settled first on Michael's land. Just four weeks later the first party of Moravian Brothers began the town of Bethabara just 12 miles north and east of Michael's land. But the Hausers, being Lutheran, knew nothing of the Moravians, and Martin was still suspicious of the sects along the frontier.

The first group of fifteen men arrived late in the evening of November 17, 1753. They took shelter for the night in a deserted Their journey began cabin. on October 8 in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. Their trip southward through Pennsylvania, Maryland, Shenandoah the Valley and Virginia is described in of fascinating detail in the Moravian Records (Volume 1, pp 75-80). {A summary of this will be included in a later report.}

Soon four of these fifteen returned to Pennsylvania and the other eleven (all single men) remained to begin the development of a settlement. These eleven men were: Johannes Beroth, Heinrich Feldhausen, Bernard Adam Grube, Erich Ingebretsen, Hans Martin Katherlahn, Johannes Lischer, Hermannus Loesch, Jacob Loesch, Jacob Lung, Christopher Merkley, Hans Petersen, and Friedrich Jacob Pfeil

These single men are not yet families, but some of these eleven will later establish their families here and become interconnected with our group of interest.

Jacob Friis arrived in April 1754 to join the initial group and a second group of eight more single men arrived on October 26. This second group included: Andreas Betz, Hans Christian Christensen, George Holder, Jacob Kapp, Johannes Nagel, Johannes Ranke, George Schmid, and Jacobus van der Merk.

Again, these single men are not yet families, but some will later establish their families here and become inter-connected with our group of interest. The village at Bethabara would be very important to our project -- even without connections to any of its families.

The presence of that frontier community was a key element in the decision of many families to settle nearby during the next eight years.

A Family Treasure

The Civil War Diary of Rufus Spainhour (cont'd) Contributed by his great-grandson Al Spainhour

January the 31 (1862)

Landed at camp today found the health of the company much better.

February the 28th, 1862

This month has brought nothing new. We worked some on our cabin and got wood about all we did. Half our Regt was once ordered off but the order was countermanded.

During the month I have had yellow jaundice.

March the 17th

We have to go to Aquia Creek as guard(?) I suppose each night.

March the 22

This eavning we received orders to go to Goldsboro N. C. which was joyful news to us.

March the 26th

Today we landed at Goldsboro after rather an unpleasant ride

March the 27th

Our Regt. was moved down towards Wilmington and located two miles from town.

Apr. the 12th

We have moved again almost east 4 miles from town. I visited Uncle (?)David Estes who is quite sick in the hospital.

May the 1st???

Today brother John C. Spain-hour came to our Regiment and on the 16th (?)I. L. Hemphill joined our command.

May the 26th

I have been sick with chills and fever ordered to leave today for Va. We stayed in Petersburg and encamped but had been but a short time afterwards we received orders to go back to N.C. The order was countermanded.

June the 1st

Before day the long roll told a doleful tale, that we were summonsed to an engagement. We moved to Richmond and there marched out on the Williamsburg road near where the battle of seven Pines had just been fought. The day was excessively hot and many of the boys came near fainting. We met may wounded and I was particular(ly) struck with a pile of arms and legs I saw lying beside the road.

June the 15th

This morning we were ordered on piquet and at 12 o'clock ordered to advance. We moved forward about two miles and met the yankees, after skirmishing sometime we were almost surrounded by the yanks, but fell back having lost the rest of the command we got lost in the swamp and did not get out till 9 o'clock at night. We lost some men ...? prisoners today.

June the 25th

For several days we have been doing piquet duty and other duty of camp.

June the 26th

Before day this morning we were moving in the direction of the Mechanicsville Pike where we lay until late at eavning when we were ordered forward and crossed the Chickahomany under fire of the enemies' Artilery. We moved forward under a heavy fire for near a mile, where we engaged them for some time at a desperate rate. We lost our Col. Maj., and many other officers and about one half the Regt. The scene was one I cannot describe, the missiles of death snatching men from all around me. Why should I be preserved? My good old friend J. C. Webb was killed suddenly, poor fellow. He little thought of death so soon. This morning's sun rose on many blooming in life who are now lying on this bloody field lifeless bodies.




