A Family Treasure

The Civil War Diary of Rufus Spainhour (cont'd)

contributed by his great-grandson Al Spainhour

March 26 (1864)

Started today on furlough spent the 26, 27, 28, 29, and 30th getting home. After staying a few days about home I visited aunt Fredericks and cousin till with me we returned and went to Lenoir, where we remained until Saturday, had some very pleasant times while in Lenoir. Spent two evenings with the young ladies (arding?) at Dr. Scroggs, viz Miss E.A. Staley, Miss Molly Ginnings and several others. Returned Saturday night to Leroy Cobb's and stayed all night. Visited some and then returned home and on Tuesday morning started back to camp and landed there Friday, April the 15. On Sabbath following heard Rev. Gaultney preach and in the evening he baptized seven converts, a great many converted persons were present and the scene was solemn and interesting. The remainder of the month was spent very quietly.

May the 4th

Today our troops moved from our former piquet line to near Locust Grove.

May the 5th

About the (crossed out) 12 o'clock our troops engaged the Yankees near the turnpike above the old Wilderness Tavern. The enemy were repulsed with heavy loss in prisoners and we got two (- - aces?) of artillery. We lost considerably. Faw, Ginnings, and (- - ockard?) and several others were wounded in our company.

Page 4 June 2007

May the 6th

Heavy fighting all along the lines today, our troops fought behind works and repulse the enemy at all points, our loss was not very great, though the slaughter among the enemy was immense. We lost Gen. Longstreet wounded and Brigadier Generals Jones and Jenkins both killed. Our victory complete.

May the 7th

Remained in lines of battle near all day with but little fighting. Tonight moved off to our right. The Yankees were attending their lines in the direction of Fredericksburg.

Sabbath May the 8th

Moved about 20 miles off in the direction of Fredericksburg till our right rested near Spotsylvania (?) C. H. with our front (near) Chancellorsville and during the night our troops fortified. This has been a very hot and dusty day and the whole wilderness almost was on fire, so the fire smoke, dust and heat of the sun all added to a very hard days march made it quite oppressive. Many gave out but most of them came up during the night.

Monday May the 9th

Strengthened our breastworks today. Not much fighting.

Thursday? May the 10th

accomplish much save getting their men killed, only they drove back Dole's Geo. Briquet. Our Brig. was ordered to their relief and soon drove them back and established our line, but Lt. Larkin Curtis was killed.

He was the only officer in our company. He was a kind and indulgent officer. Always at his post, and brave and diligent in battle and more he was a pious good Christian, but he fell while young, he lived to witness but few of the sorrows of life.

May the 11th

Times have been on the quiet order. I visited the line today, the boys were quite lively. I saw Hemphill today he was lively as usual. But b?? fighting today.

May the 12th

Day had scarcely dawned upon us when the Yankees threw a heavy force against the 2nd Va. Brigade which gave way and let the Yankees in our rear press (?) at the same time from the front, nearly all our command was captured, my brother-in-law was killed instantly, shot in the head. He might have been freed from the engagement by the Dr.'s but he would not. Col. Brown was badly wounded in three places.

M. Carlton attempted to escape but was mortally wounded and died on the 14th. He was a noble hearted, brave and intelligent man. Few nobler men have fallen than the three in my company. The fighting was most terrific, but our troop resisted them with heavy loss. Gen. Daniels died of a wound received.

Sabbath the 15th

The remnant of our two Regt. were thrown together and placed under Ramseur on the 18th they again attempted to charge our (?) lines but were repulsed by the artillery and skirmish lines. On the next day Gen. Euell (?) took his corps and reconnoitered on the left rear upon the Yankees

and had an engagement in which we lost considerably, brought off three pieces of artillery. The troops and teams are moving down towards Fredericksburg.

Monday May the 23

Left Spotsylvania on Saturday and on Sunday landed at Hanover Junction where we encamped and I received a letter from cousin J. M. Spainhour stating that grandmother is dead. She has lived to be quite old. She was 85 or perhaps more.

May the 26

Our army still in line near the Junction, with but little fighting.

June the 5th

We moved down to a point 9 miles from Richmond with our left near the Central R. R. and our right near Gantt's Mills. On the 3rd the enemy assaulted our works at various points, but were repulsed with severe loss.

June the 6th

I am sent back to my company as our Regiments have been thrown with 2nd N.C., the Yankees have disappeared from our font and are moving off to the right. We are now near the Mechanicsville Pike.

June the 7th

......and ordered that the Com. Sgt. of his Regt. and myself would draw lots, who would act Com. Sgt. for the two Regt. and the lot fell to myself.

Sabbath June the 12th

Our corps is not now in the works.

Monday the 13th

Landed at Charlottesville today having passed through a country well adorned with pretty girls and beautiful in all its scenery, being well watered and suited to farming and grazing. Where I met with Dr. Broadhurst with whom I stayed in Fredericksburg in 1861. I also visited the University of Va. which is a fine and magnificent structure, though there was no school in progress. From here we marched to North Garden Station and there took the train and went to Lynchburg. The same night we landed there (19th June) and the next day we followed them on the pike leading to Salem we passed New London and Liberty and encamped on night of the 21st near the Blue Ridge, which we crossed early next morning and still pursued the Yankees. Gen. (- - nter?), his way was literally strewn with dead horses and broken wagons. Near Salem his retreat was intercepted by our Calvary but they cut their way through and made their way across the Alagana (Allegheny) mountains but lost their artillery, six pieces.

June the 22

Today we rested, washed clothes, cooked rations, etc. This is the garden spot of the world that I have yet seen.

23rd June

Heard with regret of the death of my old friend Capt. Jacob Fryes. He belonged to 59 Tenn. Cav. and was killed at Piedmont. He was a good student and an elegant orator and a gentleman in every sense of the word. We moved today in the direction of Staunton and passed Bottotoir (?) Springs.

Saturday June the 25th

Passed through Lexington today and visited the grave of Gen. Jackson. The flag sent from England was floating over his grave. The country in this section is particularly grand. I visited the ruins of the Military Institute at this place which was destroyed by the Yankees.

Monday June 27th

Landed at Stanton today, and remained till Tuesday evening when we moved off down the valley in the direction of the Potomac. Moved down the road -ading(?) by X(?)keys. We had many scenes of interest during our passage down the valley, the fields were loaded with (?)lurient crops of wheat, which was owned by a people marked for their liberality. We passed through many nice little towns and principle ones were Mt. Jackson, Strasburg, Winchester, and the 4th of July landed at Harper's Ferry and drove the Yankees out and to their fortifications. Early then left them and moved his principle force across the Potomac at Shepherdstown and went down farther in rear of the Yankees at Harper's Ferry and made them think he would attack them and then moved in the direction of Frederickstown, MD., where on Saturday the 9th our troops, Gordon's Div., had an engagement with a portion of Wallace's Corps and whipped them badly, they retreated in bad order on the Baltimore Road, and we then took the pike leading to Washington and traveling very hard all day we landed within about 20 miles of the city, and on Monday we passed through - - ckville? and reached the breastworks of the city about 2 o'clock and soon commenced skirmishing with the Yankees in 4 miles of the city.

Thursday July the 12th

The troops were in line of battle near the breastworks of the city, land skirmished near all day at dark it was exceedingly heavy, but soon after dark Early moved off on his retreat without making an effort to capture the city, he marched all night on the retreat. Retreated on the Rollvill Ferry Road, and crossed the Potomac in seven miles of Leesburg.
