#### Elsbeth Spittler Spaenhauer

One of our American family's immigrant groups was the widow Elsbeth Spittler Spaenhauer and her four children, Heinrich, Werner, Anna & Barbara. Their safe arrival in Philadelphia in 1740 is well documented, and we have gathered much information about the lives of Heinrich & Werner. We know very little, however, about what happened to the mother and her two daughters. Previous family researchers concluded that Barbara, the youngest daughter, probably died soon after the family's arrival in Philadelphia, and that Elsbeth probably lived only a few more years (she was 48 years old in 1740).

Through the research of Bob Laughon, we know that Elsbeth was alive in Lancaster County in January of 1742, when Anna's son Henry Christe was baptized. Lois Canaday Hupfer, in her book :The Canaday/ McCormick Families" notes that son Heinrich returned to Switzerland to collect the inheritance which his grandfather had left to his mother. We know that Heinrich's voyage was in 1748 and 1749. From that information we incorrectly assumed that Elsbeth had now died - presumably in 1747 or early in 1748 – in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania.

When Heinrich returned from Switzerland in 1749, several additional Muttenz families came with him. Lancaster County was now "filling up" – so these new immigrants sought land westward in York County. Heinrich, and his brother Werner, also moved their families from Lancaster County to York County during 1749.

Thanks to Michael Spainhour and the website called "Find a Grave" we have now learned that Elsbeth did not die in Lancaster Page 2 County, but migrated with her two sons to York County

in 1749. She lived until 1759, and is buried at St. Jacob's Stone Church in York County. This is the church where Werner's twins (Johann Heinrich & Anna Elizabetha) were baptized on September 26, 1762.

This adds an interesting new perspective to the lives of our immigrant family. When Heinrich migrated south to New River, Virginia in 1752, his brother Werner remained in York County. He would be needed there to take care of their mother. Elsbeth and his own wife who was pregnant with their first child (Michael - born in January of 1753). Werner then migrated to North Carolina to join with his brother in 1763 – after their mother had died, and after peace had been negotiated at the end of the French-Indian War – making it a bit safer to travel along the Great Wagon Road through Virginia.

We are still left with mystery regarding the two sisters of Heinrich & Werner --- Anna and Barbara. We know that Anna married John Christe in 1740-1741 in Lancaster County and that they had a son named Henry who was baptized in January of 1742. Different sources contain conflicting information about the rest of Anna's family.

Contrary to earlier family researchers, we now know from Heinrich's Moravian memoir that Barbara did not die soon after the family's arrival in Philadelphia in 1740. This information is from the research of David & Nane Spainhour who arranged a second translation of Heinrich's memoir (written in 1788 not long before he died). The Memoir says that one of his sisters still lives in Pennsylvania and the other "died last year in this vicinity" (presumably in 1787). Okay, now, which was Anna and which was Barbara? Obviously, Barbara was married - but to whom we have

no idea. Without her married surname it will be very difficult to track her down.

What all of this illustrates is that these four family members kept in touch with each other throughout their lives in America. I wish they had passed more of the family news down to us!!

#### **Paternal DNA Testing**

Thanks to a note from Robert Messmore which announced the proof that two American lineages of the Muttenz family of Nicholas Mesmer & Barbara Spänhauer share a common paternal link. I still do not know much about this methodology, but my current understanding is that such tests could tell us how many generations separate our different American Spainhour lineage groups (Spainhour, Spoonhour, Spahnhauer, and Sponhour). Since we already know at least one common ancestor of all of us, such testing has not seemed very necessary - we just need to do enough research to identify the missing generation or two that remain unknown in each lineage.

Such testing might be interesting, however, to compare individuals in our Swiss Lineage and our American lineage to determine the number of generations between these two. This could tell us, for example how many generations separate our Swiss lineage beginning with Hans born in 1635 and our American lineage beginning with Arbogast born in 1580. Since many of the older church records in Muttenz are no longer available, we will undoubtedly find it difficult to fill in those generations with names.

#### Meanwhile

Work continues on integrating the large package of family information from Siegfried Grabs, and smaller packages from several others. New contacts with researchers who are working on connecting families continue to arrive and they will share their research with us. Our own research is also needed to identify and update the family interconnections that are contained in these packages. As a result of all this, our genealogy collections continue to grow and James has plenty to do.

The rest of our website, however, remains static – hoping that some new members will take charge of and recreate selected panels.

#### On Heritage Day 2011

Last year, on Heritage Day, we explored what that journey from York County, Pennsylvania to New River, Virginia in November of 1752, might have been like for Heinrich & Elizabeth Lum Spainhour and their three children, Johnnes (age 9), Maria Elisabeth (age 6), and Johann Heinrich, Jr. (age 2).

The family of Friedrich Shore, Sr. made their journey to the New River area in November of 1753 and bought a farm about 15 miles WNW of the Spainhour farm (on the opposite side of the river). This family included Friedrich, Sr. (age 48), Friedrich, Jr. (age 22), Heinrich (age 18), Johannes (age 14) and Margaretha (age 11).

The lives of both families were rudely interrupted by Indian attacks in 1755 and both families retreated southward to the Forks of the Dan where they could live temporarily in a safer area near the Moravians at Bethabara .

This year on Heritage Day, we will explore what we know (and what we wish we knew) about this war-time experience for both these families. This chapter will be titled "The Indians are Coming –

The Indians are Coming!!!"


